Every year there are two Trials at Lum's Pond State Park (Spring and Fall). This trial is the closest trial to the Academy, so every year we try to make it a party atmosphere. We set up a mini tent city, and cheer each other on throughout the weekend. We also invite other students to come and spectate, in addition to friends and family.

This year was fun again; Saturday felt like summer (70's), while Sunday had lower temperatures (40's) and rain. Everyone toughed out the conditions and we had a lot of qualifications, and titles.

Special mention goes to Laurel Pearson and her dog Shelby, who participated in their first trial at Lum's qualifying in all three of her events with 1<sup>st</sup> place ribbons, and to Michael MacLeod and Ace who earned their MACH (the highest AKC Agility title) at Lum's Pond.

# **Training Challenge**



Do you want a challenge to increase your dog's mental stimulation? Shaping can do that! This months' shaping challenge is to teach your dog "On".

What do you need?

- 1. Your Dog
- 2. Clicker or verbal cue like yes.
- 3. Treats and / or tug toy
- 4. Object(s) for your dog to get on.

This exercise is good for core strength, proprioception, and flexibility.

One option to train this behavior is to teach your dog to foot target the object they are to get on. This can be done by a few steps.

> Once you have placed the object(s) you want your dog to get on, on the ground,

- click or mark every interaction your dog makes with the object(s).
- After you have raised interest, up your criteria, and only click or mark every interaction your dog makes with the object using their feet.
- After your dog is successful putting one foot on the object, up the criteria again and require more feet.
- After you have your dog putting all of their feet on the object, determine your duration requirements.
   If you want duration, mark the behavior
- 5. Then use a release cue to end the behavior.
- 6. Build your duration by continuing to mark behavior prior to releasing; upping the

time till the duration you want is reached.

Finally, add your verbal cue to the behavior once you have exactly what you want. To do this you'll say the new Cue (I use Up).

Things to remember:

- Set your criteria before starting
- Set your dog up for success
- If you want to build duration, reward while they have their head down at a high rate, and then incorporate a release cue.
- Break up your sessions, keep sessions short and give him/her breaks within the session
- 5. Above all else, have fun with your dog!

# **Hurricane Sandy**



As Hurricane Sandy approached, I got ready, I bought food, water, and batteries, like so many up and down the East Coast. Then, the day before the storm, I realized I only had a few days of dog food left and I really needed to prepare for my dog as well.

This started me thinking, what should we know about preparedness for our 4 legged friends?

Luckily, there wasn't major flooding, power outages, or wind damage here, but, that wasn't the case about an hour and a half away.

Here's what I learned:

For emergency weather situations you should have 7 days of food, and water for your dog.

Additionally, you should keep your dogs' shot records, photos of your dogs, medicine.

collars with Identification tags, crates, and rabies certificates ready if you need to evacuate. In an evacuation do not leave your pets behind.

After Hurricane Katrina, the Pets Evacuation and Transportation Standards Act requires all states looking for FEMA assistance to accommodate pets and service animals in their plans for evacuating residents facing disasters.

For Delaware residents, Delaware SPCA runs the pet side of all evacuation shelters. Prior to large events like Sandy they will publish a list of Pet friendly shelters in Delaware.

If you don't have to evacuate, remember that your dog may be nervous or stressed. They can be sensitive to changes in barometric pressure, thunder, wind, your stress/nervousness, etc. So

be extra vigilant when you are outside with them. Inside, things like soft music, crates with blankets and mats to act as a den, and thunder shirts may help to relieve anxiety.

Also remember your dogs will need entertainment while being cooped up inside.
Teach them a new trick, play hide and seek with toys or food, generally get creative.
Remember mental stimulation can be just as tiring as physical exercise.

I am glad this area faired so well in the storm, that I took this opportunity to learn more about preparedness, and that there is infrastructure in place to keep our pets safe. My hearts go out to all of the families and pets that face hardship due to the storm.
